

*The 100, 101, 102, 105, 106, 111 and Kyoto-Okazaki Loop are currently not operating.

How to use transport cards

The first time you board

insert your card in the slot on the fare box. The date will be printed on the back.

After this, you can simply show the date to the driver.







Around Kyoto Station



Kyoto Tower

Kyoto Tower's observation deck offers a 360° panoramic view of the entire city, from 131 meters up. Enjoy looking out over Kyoto and the surrounding mountains.

Toji Temple

This is the only remaining structure from the Heian-kyo era roughly a thousand years ago, and part of a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The gates open every single morning at 5:00, and visiting this early is a great way to make the most of a day seeing the sights in Kyoto. The temple's pagoda is the tallest in Japan, at 55 meters tall. The bottom floor is opened a few times a year for the public to see inside.






Sanjusangen-do Temple

This temple in Higashiyama runs for 120 meters from north to south. It's so long that you practically can't see from one end to the other - in fact, the photo here only shows half of the exterior. This must-visit destination will take your breath away the moment you set foot inside. The temple's principal image is in the center: a seated statue of the thousand-armed Kannon. On either side are 500 standing eleven-faced thousand-armed Kannon statues, as well as the wind and thunder gods Fujin and Raijin in the front row, and the Twenty-Eight Legions. These countless statues lined up for 120 meters are a truly remarkable sight.

Exploring Central Kyoto



Nishiki Market

Famously known as "Kyoto's Kitchen" for the fresh ingredients, sweets, and various traditional foods available for sale. The covered street makes it a great destination even on rainy days enjoy the local atmosphere as you discover Kyoto's food culture, traditional crafts, and more. Note: Eating while walking around is prohibited. Please use the eat-in spaces at shops selling prepared foods.

Nishiki Tenmangu Shrine

This shrine is dedicated to the god of scholastic achievement, higher learning, and wisdom. If you look closely, the torii gate outside actually sticks into the walls of the stores next to it.






ontocho

This narrow, charming alley runs for about 500 meters, packed with tradition, history, and culture.

Simply walking the length of the alley is a lovely way to enjoy the distinctly "Kyoto" atmosphere, and the various restaurants here, located in kyo-machiya townhouses, are a paradise for food lovers.

Shijo Ohashi Bridge

This bridge over the Kamo River connects the Gion nightlife district with the Kawaramachi downtown commercial area, and sees heavy use through all hours of the day. In summer, the bridge offers an excellent view of the outdoor seating set up at the restaurants along the Kamo River, and the riverbank near the bridge is a popular place to take a walk, or to just sit and hang out on a date.

Honnoii Temple

The head temple of the Honmon school of Hokke Buddhism. It has been rebuilt and relocated seven times over the centuries, after being destroyed by fighting and fires. The temple grounds contain a monument to the warlord Oda Nobunaga, who died here by his own hand after a sudden betrayal.





Exploring the Rakuhoku and Higashiyama Areas

Yasaka Shrine

This shrine boasts a long history and plenty to see, making it a must for any visit to Kyoto. The Honden main shrine is a National Treasure, and 29 of the other buildings are designated Important Cultural Properties.

 Honden Main Hall and Haiden Worship Hall The Honden main hall is a National Treasure. It is a rare example of its architectural style, and a lovely demonstration of traditional Japanese architectural beauty.



This temple was built by the nun Kodai-in. once the wife of warlord Toyotomi Hideyoshi, as a prayer for his soul

Legend has it that she would gaze at the moon, thinking about her late husband. The temple is home to many Important Cultural Properties, such as the Kangetsudai "moon-viewing platform," and the Otamaya, a grave for this couple decorated with lacquer and *maki-e* gold powder.

Kivomizu Temple

This iconic Japanese temple is recognized by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site, and is one of Kyoto's top tourism destinations.

Hondo Main Hall (Kiyomizu Balcony)

Perhaps the most famous part of Kiyomizu Temple. This balcony, built high up on a hill, offers a stunning view of the city of Kyoto and the surrounding natural environment.

Niomon Gate

The main gate of Kiyomizu Temple features guardian statues on either side, each with its own intimidating presence.

Exploring the Saga and Arashiyama Areas



Arashiyama

This corner of Kyoto is famous for its natural scenery: it is considered one of Japan's 100 finest places to see cherry blossoms, and to see autumn colors. The Togetsukyo Bridge has long been a symbol of Arashiyama, loved centuries ago by aristocrats. This bridge marks the boundary between the Oigawa River upstream and the Katsura River downstream.

Arashiyama has plenty to see and do,

from the hot-spring-fed footbath on the platform of Arashiyama Station on the Randen Line, to the famous bamboo grove, and even the UNESCO World Heritage Site Tenryuji Temple.

Kinkakuji

Strictly speaking, this temple is called Rokuonji — the building inside is nicknamed Kinkakuji, or the "golden pavilion," based on its gold leaf decoration. In 1994, it became part of the UNESCO World Heritage Site "Historic Monuments of Ancient Kyoto." There are other places worth visiting nearby as well, such as Hirano Shrine, as well as Ryoanji Temple, which is famous for its rock garden.



Togetsukyo Bridge

This bridge crosses the Katsura River, which runs between Sagano and Arashiyama. It is said to have first been built by the monk Dosho, nearly 1,200 years ago, and was originally called Horinji Bridge, named for the temple to its south. There are also legends of a "Kotokiki Bridge" from the 12th century. Its current name, literally "crossing-moon bridge," was given to it by Emperor Kameyama roughly 750 years ago, inspired by the sight of the moon over the bridge.



Bamboo Grove

This beautiful pathway, from Nonomiya Shrine to Tenryuji Temple and Okochi Sanso Garden, offers impressive scenery worth a stroll through.







Fushimi-Inari Taisha Shrine (Red Gate Shurine)

Fushimi-Inari Taisha Shrine is the head shrine for all Inari shrines nationwide, and one of the oldest shrines in Kyoto. It draws more visitors than nearly any other shrine in Japan, and is especially lively on New Year's Day, the first day of each month, and on Hatsu-uma (the first Day of the Horse of the new lunar year). The shrine is famously dedicated to the god of business prosperity: the name "Inari" comes from "Inenari," which sounds like "ripening rice." Inari was originally the god of bountiful harvests, which broadened in meaning over time from only farmers to also people involved in business in general.

The shrine's famous Senbon-Torii, or "thousand torii gates," were given as donations in thanks for prayers answered.

















Exploring the Tofukuji Area




Tofukuji Temple(Zen Temple)

The head temple of the Tofukuji school of Rinzai Zen Buddhism.

Tofukuji Temple is a training temple for monks, but it is also a popular sightseeing destination, famous for its gorgeous autumn colors. The temple grounds include many celebrated buildings, including ones designated National Treasures and Important Cultural Properties.



Exploring the Shimogamo and Kyoto Gyoen Areas




Shimogamo Shrine

Named for its location (literally "Lower Kamo Shrine"), downstream along the Kamo River. It is a part of the UNESCO World Heritage Site "Historic Monuments of Ancient Kyoto."

There are two Honden main shrines, to the east and west. The eastern one is dedicated to the goddess Tamayori-hime, and the western one is

dedicated to the god Kamotaketsunumi.
